Welcome

As a little kid, I remember my family's garage filled to the ceiling with baskets. I had no idea why — I understood it was just part of my father's job. My sister and I often made tunnels and forts in the twisted wicker jungle. Baskets & Blades, Ltd., was a subsidiary of Forschner Knives, the company where my father got his introduction to the knife world. He worked his way to the position of Vice President of Sales & Marketing, before retiring from the position in 1986 and eventually opening our current shop, Freeport Knife Co., Inc., in 1991.

Baskets & Blades, Ltd., was long dissolved before Victorinox took over the Forschner brand entirely and changed their name to Swiss Army Brands, Inc., in 1996, and later Victorinox Swiss Army in 2011. Our shop remains, now known as Casco Bay Cutlery & Kitchenware; this year we celebrated our 30th anniversary in June. A special knife was requested to commemorate this anniversary: a red alox Solo model bearing our original company name, dates of operation and a celebratory message. Acquiring anything from overseas this year has been a testament to patience, and Victorinox has not been immune to these delays. Our anniversary knife is expected to arrive in January.

We have just received our special VSAKCS 2021 knives as we enter the busiest shopping week of the year. I am quite impressed with this year's design, as I'm sure all of you will be as well. We have chosen to incorporate a texturized printing method representing an artist's swatch palette on a Super Tinker to commemorate the new Victorinox Classic Colors collection. Swiss China

Collecting Swiss Army Knives can be a simple endeavor... or not. Over the years it has been my great pleasure to have developed acquaintances across the globe. One such individual has had some long standing grand plans come to fruition this year.

On June 18th, 2021, Mr. Haoran Yang hosted the grand-opening of his very own private Swiss Army Museum. Dubbed the Collection of Sharpness – his display is open to the public in Chongqing, China. Over 100 people attended the opening ceremony, including many formal members of both the Swiss and local Chinese chambers of Commerce and Commission of Culture and Tourism.

Mr. Yang is the Director of the VSAKC China club. The collector's market in China has exploded in popularity in

It can be quite an endeavor for completionists to acquire some of these pieces, as production quantity often runs small, and shipping knives outside of the country is no simple task.

The Chinese Swiss Army collector's Club has undergone many changes over the years. Originally starting in 2007 as the China Swiss Saber Forum, many interesting knives have found their origins through development by this group.

The Collection of Sharpness does not showcase every Swiss Army Knife in existence, but instead has a strong focus on interest and history. Each model on display represents something different. Mr. Yang's first club knife (The Cutter - produced in 2019) was designed with a meticulous consideration for detail, function, and uniqueness. Our VSAKCS club was honored to receive one for our private display, which can be viewed in our Freeport, Maine, shop.

On behalf of VSAKCS USA, we wholeheartedly congratulate Mr. Haoran Yang on his accomplishment, and wish his museum great and continued popularity for many years to come!

On a similar note, another interesting correspondence came from an old email in the archives of our club's original president, Dan Jacquart. In the email, it is stated by Mr. Robert Elsener some insightful production and quantity numbers for some of the more popular 108mm knives. It reads as follows:

Mauser knife: was produced between 1984 and 2001. About 240,000 pcs were made. Walther knife: was produced in 1996/97. Only 4972 pcs where made. Real stag hunter (0.8780.66): was produced between 1975 and 1995. About 500 pcs were made.


A Collectors Guide to Vintage Wenger Knives

The undoubted highlight of this year for collectors of Swiss knives was the book A Collectors Guide to Vintage Wenger Knives by Dave Arnold.

This wonderful book was written by the renowned collector of vintage Swiss knives, Dave Arnold from Canada. We all know him from nice videos on his friend Hobbie's YouTube channel. Many of the rarest Swiss knives from Dave's collection have been featured on the Hobbie channel, but the book is something else!

The book is devoted to the history primarily of Wenger knives and shows the evolution of Wenger knives



From the very beginning, the book is full of surprises. Dave starts his story from 1890 and he doesn't just show pictures of the first SAK, but we can see a demonstration of how to actually take apart a Schmidt-Rubin mod. 1889 rifle using the Elsener mod. 1890 (process photos courtesy of Ernst Thomann).

The book presents the entire line of soldier's knives from Wenger, starting with the extremely rare model 1890 made by Coutellerie Suisse in 1900 under the direction of Theo Wenger.

Dave's particular affection is Wenger officer knives and the book traces their detailed evolution of 82/93mm from 1905 to the modern 85mm range from 1963. A lot of information about construction, technology, blade stamps and scale emblems was presented in detailed images.

Besides Soldiers and Officers knives we see a lot of rare models of farm knives, fixed hunting knives and even different versions of Hobo set made by Wenger.

Other knife manufacturers from Switzerland and Germany are also featured in the book. Here's a great set of vintage Victorinox knives including extra rare aluminum mod. 240 from 1903 Elsener Catalog.



Let's give the floor to the author:

"Having said that, this book is meant to be an invitation to join the search for answers, not a lecture on what has already been found.

In fact, it could be said that the best part of this hobby is the collector community itself. Like most things, there are good and bad people in this pastime, but, thanks to my knives, I have made real friends all over the world. We correspond weekly, if not daily. We share our knives, their stories, and together try to solve the many mysteries buried within the long history of the

Swiss Army knife. We rely on each others knowledge and experience in our never ending hunt for the rarest gems of SAK collecting.


Another point worth making, is that in this hobby, there is always something new to learn. On a regular basis, we will see something that is either new to us, or flies in face of what we previously thought was true. With such a long history, so many models, endless variations from multiple manufacturers, combined with the lack of information from the early years, I have no doubt that there are still more things still to be discovered...

One of the most important decisions we face in this adventure is "What will you collect?" It is nearly impossible to collect them all. If you are just starting out, I would say collect a little bit of everything and see what you like the most. Certainly, for myself, my preferences changed as I dove deeper into the hobby. Somewhere along that road, the focus of my collection shifted towards Delemont, and then back in time, but I also still search for the rarest knives from Victorinox and other Swiss knife makers. You will find your own favorites. In my opinion, there is a quality, of materials and craftsmanship, used in the earlier knives, things like brass rivets and liners, nickel silver tipped tweezers, or even just the patina of a well cared for carbon steel knife, that the modern knives simply can't compete with.

I also love the history of an old knife. Where has it been? Who has owned it? How many bottles of wine has the cork screw opened? How many blocks of cheese or bread has the knife cut into? Where was it through one, or both of the world wars that surrounded Switzerland? If it was a soldier's knife was it in the pocket of a soldier standing guard in those times? Where else has this knife gone in its life? Has it left Europe before? Or traveled around the world? So many questions.

...Finally, the focus of this book is vintage WENGER knives, but of course like most collectors I have an interest in all things SAK. I also have knives that are from Victorinox and other Swiss makers like Rothlisberger, and I will show some of these, along with a few of my favorite German knives.

So let's get started, and thank you. I hope you will enjoy reading this as much as we have enjoyed compiling it. ...I hope the world is in a better place when you are reading this, wherever you are."

In honor of the company's Classic Colors collection, the design we have chosen represents an artist's digital swatch palette. We have dubbed this knife the 'Colorist'.

Only one knife per person.

Cost is \$100.00 USD + tax and shipping. Customs fees and import taxes are the responsibility of the buyer.

Members in Switzerland and Norway may choose to place orders through Mr. Schiesswald. (see details below), as the shipping costs will be lower, but the base price will be higher due to import taxes.
